## **CHAIR'S REPORT**

1 May 2024 - 30 April 25

#### 1. Governance

As from the May meeting of 2024 the Trustee Board comprised the same 7 Trustees from the previous year. Revd Dan Haylett, Jennie Gilbert, Jo Barton, Cameron Williams, Rachel Angel, Denise Barnes, and Chair John Bunter continued to serve. Also continuing were Dilanee Bunter, Head of Operations, Tim Rüpke and Amali Bunter as Co-opted Trustees, and Wendy Haynes as Minutes Secretary.



A number of Sub-Committees met between the 6 full TB Meetings in the year and reported back to the OGM - notably, a Finance Group, Child Development Programme (CDP), JAYDD (the business arm of the charity),

Child/Teacher Sponsorship, School Links, and ad hoc meetings for example, for Fundraising activities. Two further groups were formed during the year and met most productively – for "OST20", and for the Website regeneration.

Equally, communication was a weekly event by Zoom for Dilanee with the Ocean Stars Lanka (OSL) staff. Indeed, OSL staff sat with, and contributed fully to, the CDP group at their meetings.

The annual OST September Awayday continues to be a most valuable strategy-forming conference for Trustees, producing goals for the coming year and beyond. Trustees' thanks are due to Amali Bunter for the professionalism with which she approaches the convening of this meeting. Out of the last Awayday, for example, OST has established an Ambassador programme.

The Trust has continued to exist to bring support to communities in need, mostly in the Eastern Province of Sri Lanka (Batticaloa, Trincomalee) and it has been the work of the Trustee Board to ensure that the financial resources brought to the Trust are used in the most appropriate and cost-effective way.



### **CHAIR'S REPORT**

#### 2. Finance

Prior to Independent Examination, accounts suggest a turnover in the region of £115,000 for the year to 30 April. This is similar to the previous year. A varying £/SLRupee exchange rate (between 360 to 400) sometimes made some financing problematic and kept Trustees mindful of the Contingency fund of £17,000. Trustees were however able to maintain ample support for established projects. In addition, with very generous funding from Goldranch Investments Ltd (feeding programme), continuing support from Fonthill Foundation (educational projects), and other smaller individual and corporate donations, OST was able to expand its operations gently further.

#### 3. Supported Projects and Impact

Our Restricted Funds allow us to support the sponsorship programme (some 150 of the neediest youngsters in Batticaloa and Trincomalee), and a number of our preschool teachers. Unrestricted Funds pay our staff in OSL (Ocean Stars Lanka, who manage our projects on OST's behalf), our ongoing expenses in maintaining the OSL operation, and other capital projects, when funds allow.

With the benefit of Goldranch's increased financial support, OST has allowed some 800 of OST-supported preschool children to be given a daily nutritious breakfast. Our Child Development Programme, which assesses educational progress, has shown clearly how the feeding programme has advanced achievement in the preschools. The support of Fonthill enabled some 60 preschool teachers to meet together in July for Teacher Training, and at other shorter meetings. This programme is the envy of the Education Department of Eastern Province. Through the OST Gift Catalogue programme, many individuals have benefitted over the year, not least local fishermen who have been donated new boats.

#### 4. Visits to Sri Lanka

Dilanee, our Head of Operations led a school group of 15 students and 3 teaching staff on a trip to Sri Lanka in October. This included extensive volunteering in our preschools and secondary link schools in Eastern Sri Lanka. In many instances, for the students concerned, the experiences were life-changing, and there is every indication that these visits will restart annually, now in the post-COVID period. The students from Calthorpe Park School raised in excess of £12,000 for OST causes, some of which they could see "in action" whilst there.

In addition, Dilanee visited the area in June to observe and monitor the OSL operation, and in particular, the Teacher Training. Through JAYDD, Dilanee has enabled other interested parties to visit OST/OSL activities – visitors who have reported back very favourably!

#### 5. "OST20"

In March 2025 OST held its 122nd OGM and marked a 20-year anniversary since its founding as a Registered Charity. A subcommittee combined magnificently to organise a celebratory event at the Lismoyne Hotel, Fleet, on 22 March, which 109 supporters attended, to feast on a curry meal, listen to inspiring speakers, enjoy each other's company, and dance the night away to a local band. The event coincided with the public revealing of OST's new website.

We extend our thanks to Trustee Denise for her priceless work on the website and to the members of the subcommittee who organised such an enjoyable event. The event was graced by two young men flown in from Sri Lanka, Basith and Thusanthan, who have benefited through sponsorship and other OST support over the years. This, the publicity from attendees, the inspiring speakers, especially Revd David Jebb, the updated and more accessible website, have all served to introduce new sponsors and other new funds, the benefit of which OST will, I am sure, gain in the coming years.

#### 6. Summary

This was a special year for OST, culminating in the OST20 celebration. We have gained from a group of Trustees who have all offered their personal gifts and skills to advance the movement. As Head of Operations, Dilanee has continued her unparalleled commitment to the charity, keeping up communications, following up new leads, establishing new contacts and guiding Trustees in their deliberations. It is primarily through this attention that OST has been able to advance its work, and Trustees are duly thankful to Dilanee.

# OCEAN STARS 20 YEARS

2005 - 2025



Revd David Jebb was our honoured guest at our 20th Celebration on the 22 nd of March 2025. Here is Revd David's speech, where he recalls the events of 2004, and how by chance Dilanee and he connected Ocean Stars was established in Batticaloa.

First and foremost, I would like to express my deepest gratitude for the kind invitation extended to Jenet and me to join you in celebrating the 20th anniversary of the formation of the Ocean Stars charity. This milestone is a testament to the tremendous journey that began in response to the devastating tsunami that struck Asia, particularly Sri Lanka, in December 2004. It is an honour to stand here among you, reflecting on the resilience, faith, and compassion that have emerged from such an immense tragedy.

For me, the events of that tragic day remain permanently imprinted in my memory. On the morning of Boxing Day, 2004, I received the heart-breaking news that I had lost 11 immediate family members, including my beloved father and sister. The sheer magnitude of grief and disbelief was overwhelming, leaving me utterly shaken and unsure of how to move forward.

My world, like the world of so many others, was irreversibly shattered in an instant. However, amid my sorrow, I found comfort in the unwavering support of my church community in North Camp, as well as from compassionate individuals across the country who surrounded me with prayers and moral encouragement. Their kindness and solidarity reminded me that even in the depths of despair, love endures.



Determined to reach my homeland, I embarked on a challenging 25-hour journey, fraught with numerous flight cancellations due to the disaster. Eventually, on December 31, 2004, I arrived in Batticaloa, Sri Lanka, only to face the painful reality that none of my family members' bodies had been recovered. We searched tirelessly for closure, but in the end, we had to accept their absence in faith. Nine days later, we gathered for a service of thanksgiving, honouring their memory and seeking peace in the midst of immeasurable loss. In that sacred moment, surrounded by grief yet held together by faith, I understood that healing, however slow, begins in community.

Upon returning to the UK, I was overcome with a deep sense of restlessness and helplessness. I yearned to contribute in some way but struggled to discern how best to channel my grief into meaningful action.

It was during this time that I received an email from Dilanee, reaching out with a simple yet profound question: "Is there anything I can do to help?" That email marked the beginning of a remarkable journey. Shortly after, I had the privilege of meeting Dilanee Bunter, who visited me in North Camp with a message of hope for those who had lost everything in the aftermath of the tsunami. She assured me that she would bring together a group of dedicated individuals to support those affected. Her words brought immense relief to my heart, and for the first time since the tragedy, I felt the stirrings of hope.

The first anniversary of the tsunami in December 2005 became a defining moment. We gathered for a remembrance service at Gillingham Methodist Church in Kent, where Dilanee spoke with passion and conviction.

It was then that I truly saw the birth of Ocean Stars—a charity that has since become a beacon of hope and transformation for countless lives. What began as an idea fuelled by compassion has blossomed into a force for good, bringing light to those who once stood in darkness. I remain personally grateful to Dilanee, John, and all those who have tirelessly dedicated themselves to this cause.

As we come together today to mark 20 years since the tsunami, we reflect on the lives lost and, more importantly, renew our commitment to those who continue to bear the burden of its aftermath. We remember that tragedy does not have the final word—hope does. Faith does. Love does. And through the work of Ocean Stars, we witness these truths in action every single day.



I extend my heartfelt appreciation to Dilanee and her devoted team for their extraordinary efforts in uplifting the people of Sri Lanka, particularly the vulnerable children whose education and future they have steadfastly supported. Your work is a testament to faith in action, demonstrating that even in the face of tragedy, God's love and compassion can shine through the hands and hearts of those willing to serve.

Thank you once again for allowing me to be part of this significant occasion. It is a privilege to stand alongside you as we remember, honour, and continue the mission of bringing hope to those in need. May we go forward with renewed determination, inspired by the journey we have walked together, and may the Ocean Stars charity continue to shine brightly for many years to come.

Wendy Haynes, who has supported Ocean Stars and has supported our students from the outset.

Charlotte Oram who joined us on several trips to Sri Lanka and gave children the most amazing experiences. Ross Walker, our Head of Music, whose care, dedication and compassion for those in Sri Lanka shines though in all he does.

Ocean Stars Sri Lankan staff who support this phenomenal experience. The staff, Headteachers and of course all of the wonderful children we get to work with when our teams visit.

The benefits of this partnership extend far beyond financial aid. The human, the personal, inter-personal, social and global dimension too. Throughout the years of working together, Calthorpe Park students and those in the Batticaloa district, Navalady, Urani, Sri Sithy, Shakti, Muravodai and Vipulanantha have danced, sung, played and interacted with one another. Often overcoming and breaking down the barriers of language, hearing, and vision. Nothing can quantify the positive impact of these interactions, other than to say that memories have been formed and global understanding between the young people endures.



When our students visit Sri Lanka to work alongside the children and families supported by Beyond Boundaries and Ocean Stars, they embark on a journey that leaves a lasting imprint on their hearts and minds.

These experiences immerse our students in a different culture, broadening their perspectives and teaching them invaluable lessons about resilience, empathy, and global citizenship.

They witness firsthand the joy and gratitude of those they help and return home enriched by the spirit of community and connection.

This 12-year partnership between us exemplifies the best of what we can achieve when we come together with compassion and commitment. I want to thank all Calthorpe Park School students past and present and their families for your continued support and involvement. Your contributions make a world of difference, not just for those we help but for our entire school community. Thank you for being part of this remarkable journey and for showing that when we reach beyond boundaries, we create change that transcends borders.





## SPONSORSHIP IMPACT STORY

My sponsor, Jackie, always sent him photos of her family, and he used to send photos and letters back. His life has been completely supported and transformed



At Ocean Stars, we remain dedicated to providing a high-quality preschool education for every child in our care. Our teachers play a key role in this commitment by working alongside us to implement the Child Development Programme. This initiative supports improved teaching practices, careful tracking of each child's progress, and enhanced classroom resources. Through this collaborative effort, we strive to create a nurturing environment where every child is equipped to grow, learn, and succeed. The three key areas of the Child Development Programme persist:


- (a) **Teacher Training**: We once again owe a great deal of thanks to our dedicated supporters at the Fonthill Foundation. Their continued assistance in funding our Teacher Training for the Assessment Tool provides us the ongoing opportunity to provide this valuable service to our teachers. The regular training sessions allow our teachers an in depth introduction and familiarisation opportunity, with new curriculum updates, the effective use of tablets, and the sharing of best practices among our teacher network and outside professionals.
- **(b) Assessment Tool:** We continue to develop and improve the CDP Assessment Tool. In tracking each child's progress in early years development this allows our teachers the best opportunity to work smarter with their classes and see the benefits, and this year has been another of great positive support for the usability of the tool. The new area of numeracy added to the tool in 2024 has also proved a great success and we are confident will prove to be another critical addition to the Child Development Programme.
- **(c) Resourcing:** Ocean Stars Trust continues to provide our schools with the resources they require, with 8 new tablets distributed to our schools where needed.


The CDP steering group formed of Ocean Stars Trustees and Ocean Stars Lanka staff continues to meet once a month to discuss the strategy and outcomes of the programme.



#### 2024 Assessment Tool Data

In 2024/25 we were delighted to continue working with 23 full support schools and 7 soft support, reaching 744 preschool children. However, this year we also took the ambitious step to consolidate our excellent work by expanding the coverage of the tool with a paper-based system, without the requirement for digital data recording we have reduced the setup and support cost required. Therefore, through collaboration with the pre-school bureau, we have selected and begun supporting a further 12 preschools, 394 students, with their pre-school education going forward. With this expansion, we make further steps in growing our reach to 1138 students whom we work to positively impact in their preschool journey across Sri Lanka.

Through these graphs, we can see the enormous variability in the number of students that attend the schools that we work with, and we continue to target our work to those schools we believe we can have the greatest impact with, largely focusing on those in rural locations.

With the addition of new schools to those we work with and another new specialism now being taught to our children via the CDP tool, we are absolutely delighted that our children and teachers continue to show great results as they progress through the Ocean Stars Curriculum.

In addition to the expansion of the reach of the tool, we added further resources and indicators to reflect on the vital educational building block of Communication and Language. Formed of the foundational elements of Listening, Understanding and Speaking, the early indications of the progress of Ocean Stars students in this area are extremely positive and, as ever, are being attentively recorded by our excellent teachers. We will continue to stay closely connected with all our schools, ensuring we are always available to listen and provide support. Our goal is to make sure our journey with the CDP tool continues in developing it to become the valuable resource we know it is, enhancing and not hindering the work of the dedicated teachers and schools we partner with.



# PRESCHOOL FEEDING PROGRAMMES

2024/2025

In 2023 Feeding Programmes were launched across our poorest preschools following requests from Preschool teachers, DS Offices and our own local staff. Currently we have 15 preschools on our Feeding programme and over 600 students access a nutritional meal every day. Since the Feeding Programme started in July 2022 over 60,000 meals have been distributed to our students. We are very grateful to individual donors and Goldranch PLC for supporting our Feeding programmes. We are pleased that data shows that OST preschool students are not as malnourished and are indeed gaining weight. These Feeding Projects are essential for our Early Years programmes. Data from our CDP poll shows that students who are well-nourished perform better than those who are not. Examples of weight gain post-introduction of the Programme are below.

Ocean Stars Trust UK and Ocean Star Lanka are indebted to our preschool teachers who do an extraordinary job often under challenging circumstances. OST UK pays the wages of 45 staff preschool staff in Sri Lanka. The teachers receive a saree as their uniform and a work bag from Ocean Stars UK. All the children who attend our preschools also receive a uniform and a school bag.

Our teachers value the support they get from us and most of them have been working with us for several years. They value the regular visits from our staff on the ground. They value the teacher training that we offer them. These events give them the opportunity to network with other teachers and exchange good practice. The teachers are very grateful for the nutrition programmes which mean that all our preschool students are able to access their early years learning free from hunger.



My name is Puvanesarasa Thushenthini, and I had the privilege of studying at Hope House 02 in 2023. I am extremely thankful to Ocean Stars Lanka for offering such a wonderful opportunity to women in our community. Through their tailoring course, I learned many valuable sewing techniques. Before joining, I had no idea how to sew or even operate a sewing machine. Today, I am proud to say that I now run my own business, selling clothes that I design and make myself. The people in my area love the clothes I create, and because of this, I'm able to earn an income. This income helps me support my family, buy supplies for my tailoring business, and take care of my personal needs.

I am financially independent, and it feels empowering. I am truly grateful to Ocean Stars Lanka for helping me and other women gain skills that lead to a better life. I hope that other girls in my community can have the same opportunity and grow like I did.





My name is Inthiralingam Suventhirarajah, and I received a boat from Ocean Stars one year ago. I am 31 years old, and this is the first time I have owned my own boat. This means that I can earn my own income and be independent and provide for my family. The OSL fishing boat has been very helpful and has improved my standard of living. My income has increased, and I now earn about 30,000.00 per month with my new boat. Previously, I earned only 10,000.00 per month because I had to rent a boat and pay the rental fee every month. Now that I own my own boat, I am very happy and grateful for the donation of this new boat. It has transformed my life.



## TRUSTEE REPORT

JENNIE GILBERT

This year was a significant year for Ocean Stars Trust, as we celebrated the charity's 20th anniversary in March. We were keen to celebrate this joyous occasion and held a fantastic event for our friends and supporters, with speeches from people with significant ties to Ocean Stars, some delicious Sri Lankan food, and a live band and party to finish. It was great to come together and recognise the achievements of Ocean Stars over the years, and to thank our loyal supporters for keeping us going for all these years. It was particularly special to have two visitors from Sri Lanka join us - one who had been sponsored by someone in the UK throughout their childhood, and one who had grown up in Grace children's home in Sri Lanka. Being able to hear the impact OST has had on their lives was truly incredible.



Last year, we decided to completely re-develop our website, led by Trustee, Denise Barnes, which we were able to launch in time for our celebration party. We have been blessed in the past by some great connections and partnerships that have found us via our website, so we felt that making our website even stronger than it was before would be beneficial to the charity. We hope that our new website has a cleaner, fresher and simpler feel to it, and will enable even more new connections in the future.

Our work on the ground continues to be driven by our Child Development Programme (CDP), which has also been developed in the last year to include additional skill assessments, and the programme itself has been expanded to more schools. We are thrilled with the positive response to our CDP and are looking to continue to strengthen and drive this moving forwards. Local council officers were particularly impressed with the programme and were keen for us to roll it out to more schools. The CDP is at the heart of what we do, enabling children access to a quality early years education, and empowering them to have brighter futures.



### TRUSTEE REPORT

The impact of nutrition on attainment has also been highlighted through our CDP, hence, a focus of ours continues to be our feeding programmes, ensuring that children have access to nutritious meals to fuel their learning. We are grateful for the financial support we have received for our feeding programmes, and hope we are able to continue to offer nutritious meals to those who need them.

Recognising our reliance on local support in and around Fleet, Hampshire, we developed and launched our Ambassador programme, which we hope will enable us to reach more communities throughout the UK by having dedicated Ambassadors representing OST across the country - spreading the word of who we are and what we do, fundraising and bringing on new supporters. We hired our first Ambassador and hope that she will be the first of many!

In the run-up to celebrating 20 years of Ocean Stars, we started planning and hosting 20 fundraising events. There has been a real variety of events held, from sponsored runs to our annual quiz, to Calthorpe Park's weekly tuckshop. We are extremely grateful for all of the hard work of our fundraisers, as well as everyone who has donated to OST. Calthorpe Park students have, once again, raised an amazing amount of money for OST - the team who went on the trip to Sri Lanka in October 2024 but also the team that are preparing for their trip to Sri Lanka in October 2025. We are very lucky to have such a wonderful connection with Calthorpe Park School.

We would like to thank all of our supporters for their generosity, which makes all of our work possible.

20 years and counting! Ocean Stars has celebrated a significant milestone this year of over 2 decades of investing in local communities in order to achieve our vision of every child in Sri Lanka enjoying equal opportunities through our work.

We are celebrating 20 years of working with grassroots communities, securing solid foundations for education and social empowerment. Over 11,500 children have been impacted through our preschools and over 250,000 meals have been provided as just two indicators of the impact of our work.
